Dr. Patrick Valdez

KEYNOTE PRESENTER

Valdez is an accomplished higher education executive with 25 years of experience in developing and executing academic and student success programs. He is currently serving as a Visiting Professor at the University of Kentucky's College of Education and Program Chair of the Senior Diversity Officer Certificate Program. He is a former Chancellor and Professor of Education at The University of New Mexico - Taos, and he has held senior level positions at the College of Mount St. Vincent in New York City, The University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA), the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Uni-

versities (HACU), the Association of Public and Landgrant Universities (APLU) and Lehman College, CUNY.

Valdez is the Immediate-Past Chair of the American Association of Hispanics in Higher Education (AAHHE) Board of Directors, **AAHHE Board** Chair (2022-2023), a member of the NSF Includes Accelerate Latinx





Representation in STEM Education (ALRISE) Advisory Board, and a former member of the American Council on Education (ACE) equityminded leadership advisory committee.

Valdez has conducted research and practice on the challenges and obstacles of first-generation college students, and given presentations on executive leadership, African American facultv experience at a tier one university, increasing the number of underrepresented students in STEM, and bridging the gap between higher education and the community. His current research focuses on the policy formation of Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) legislation and the role that HSIs will play in educating the nation's fastest growing student population.

Valdez is a graduate of St. Edward's University with a bachelor's degree in International Studies, a master's degree in student personnel administration from Teachers College, Columbia University, and a doctorate in higher education administration from The University of Texas at Austin.

Dra. Marissa C. Vasquez

KEYNOTE PRESENTER

Vasquez is an Associate Professor of Postsecondary Educational Leadership in the Department of Administration, Rehabilitation, and Postsecondary Education at San Diego State University. She also serves as the Director

of the M.A. in Postsecondary Educational Leadership and Student Affairs Program. As a community college scholar, Vasquez uses an antideficit lens to understand and interrogate the pre/post transitional

experiences of community college and transfer students, particularly first-generation and racially minoritized communities. As the Associate Director of the Community College Equity Assessment Lab (CCEAL), she leads efforts to assist community colleges in identifying challenges to equity-centered institutional effectiveness and developing problem-solving strategies and solutions.

A native of San Diego, Vasquez earned her A.A. from Southwestern College, B.A. in English from UC Berkeley, M.A. in Counseling from the University of San Diego, and her Ed.D. in Community College Leadership from San Diego State University.







Dr. Ricardo Pelegrin Taboada

Pelegrin Taboada completed his PhD in History at Florida International University in 2018. He also holds a law degree from the University of Havana, and a master's degree in

International Law (LLM) from the University of Miami.

Dr. Doris Cancel-Tirado Cancel-Tirado is the Associate Dean of Student Services and Well-being for the College of Health at Oregon State University and a Professor of Public Health. She holds a doctorate in Human

Development and Family Science and a Master's in Public Health from Oregon State University. Doris focuses her research on the well-being of immigrants and low-income families, addressing critical issues such as health disparities, food insecurity, and poverty.

Costagliola is also the author of "AIDS in Latin American Cuir / Queer Literature" (Santiago, Cuarto Propio, 2017), examining the intersection of physical and textual illness through cuir/queer literature, demonstrating the performative power of writing in social change. She takes pride in her role as the advisor of the Spanish Club, contributing to the support, visibility, and engagement of students with the Spanish language, Hispanic culture, and fostering an environment that encourages students to embrace diverse perspectives as a vital aspect of our rich cultural diversity, both inside and outside the classroom.
