Where are we with assessment?

- · Our Program Learning Outcomes are complete
- Our Course Goals database is not complete:
 - 14% of undergraduate courses being offered in the Fall 2020 term *do not have Course Goals* in our curriculum system
 - 41% of graduate courses being offered in the Fall 2020 term do not have Course Goals in our curriculum system
 - · Course goals are required to be on our course syllabuses



How are we doing with Program Assessment?

- 75% of Programs submitted 2018-19 Program Assessment Reports
- Last year I used a rubric to assess our assessment practices
 - 11 categories with 3 levels

Category	Benchmark	Satisfactory	Exemplary
Data Source	Data is collected, but not at a consistent point in the program	Data collected includes work performed near the end of the academic program	Data is collected from a culminating experience shared by all students
	Data collection is post- hoc rather than planned	Sample is from student representing mode of expected performance	Sampling is random (for larger programs) or all majors are included (<10 grads per year)
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How are we doing with Program Assessment?

- 75% of Programs submitted 2018-19 Assessment Reports
- · Last year I used a rubric to assess our assessment practices
 - 11 categories with 3 levels
 - · Strengths in our assessment practices:
 - Data Source: 2.5 out of 3
 - Means of Assessment: 2.0 out of 3
 - Weaknesses in our assessment practices:
 - Target Identification: 1.1 out of 3
 - Evidence Storage: 1.2 out of 3
- Revised Graduate Learning Outcomes (GLOs) approved by Faculty Senate
 - Graduate Studies Professional Learning Community revised Core Content Knowledge (GLO) rubric in 2019-20

Assessment of Undergraduate Learning Outcomes

NWCCU Standard 1.C.6

- Bachelors of Music Core is now aligned with the General Education Program
- Baccalaureate of Applied Science Core is now aligned with the General Education Program
- Honors Committee developed a plan to assess the Honors Program curriculum
- The General Education PLC focused on Foundational Skills (General Education Learning Outcome)
 - · Revised rubric
 - Assessed First Year Seminars

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What's Planned for 2020-21?

- Complete our Course Goals database for all courses taught in 2020-21
- Re-align graduate Course Goals with the new Graduate Learning Outcomes
- General Education PLC will:
 - Assess Foundational Skills (GELO) and Quantitative Literacy (ULO)
 - · Review other GELO rubrics
- 100% completion of 2019-20 Program Assessment Reports
- Improvement in our Program Assessment processes as an institution
 - · Target Identification, Evidence Storage
- Graduate Studies PLC will be revising Applied Skills (GLO) rubric
- Working with graduate programs to revise their assessment work to address the Graduate Learning Outcomes
