- Re-engage a Wolf campaign... I'd like to share a few statistics for the degree completion project in which LaRon Tolley has been engaged. As you know LaRon is digging through Banner records identifying students who have large numbers of credits but no degree and have dropped out. Since September 2016, 19 students were recruited back to campus and have successfully graduated (14 in their original degree choice; 5 after switching to interdisciplinary studies). In addition, 16 additional students are now re-engaged with WOU and making progress toward degree completion 5 of the 16 should graduate this spring. Some of these students have also made arrangements with the business office to carry debt owed to the university while taking classes.
- Art faculty members recognized: for the official record, I also wish to join the chorus of appreciation for

 colleagues Kim Hoffman, Sung Park and Mary Harden and their art students for the now famous salmon
