2. We have had numerous conversations about the student absence notification system, in the past two weeks. I have become aware that this system is used in a wide variety of ways and there are many factors that come into play for students and faculty. There are also many options that faculty and students have when there is an extended absence (e.g., incompletes, withdrawal, partial withdrawal, loner term disability).

In speaking with Ryan Hagemann, I have also learned that it may be possible to for Student Success and Advising to accept and store HIPPA protected information, if we choose to invest in doing so. There may be a financial cost in creating the infrastructure and training protocols. I am scheduling another meeting with Ryan Hagemann, Malissa Larson, and Niki Weight to explore whether we can create a HIPPA compliant system within Student Success and Advising.

Ultimately, we might want to convene a taskforce of faculty and key administrators to work on the system and processes. We might also want to give Student Success and Advising some guidance, if they will be asked to determine whether a reason for an absence is valid.

3. I am pleased to announce that Michelle (Chelle) Batchelor will begin serving as Dean of Library and Academic Innovation on August 1st, 2019. Chelle is currently serving as the Interim Associate Dean of Libraries for Research and Learning Services at the University of Washington, where she has also served at Director of Access Services and Research Librarian. She has also held positions at University of Nevada Las Vegas and University of Oregon.

As we were getting to know Chelle, it was clear that she is very well qualified to lead the library as well as help us increase the capacity of the Center for Academic Innovation to support teaching and innovation at WOU. Her most recent publication, from 2018, was about open education resources (OERs), which we are committed to at WOU, in part because OERs have the potential to significantly reduce the cost of textbooks for our students.

# Oregon Transfer Project Western Oregon University (WOU) Data

### Why was WOU selected as a case study institution?

At WOU, the bachelor's degree (BA) completion rate for community college transfer students (who were recent public high school graduates) is **6.3 percentage points higher than expected** based on statistical analyses (see figure 1 note). The actual and predicted BA completion rates for all community college transfer students and American Indian/Alaska Native, Black, and Latinx/Hispanic community college transfer students is displayed in figure 1.

Figure 1. The BA completion rate for community college transfer students (who were recent public high school graduates) at WOU is higher than expected



Notes: The predicted bachelor's completion rates are based on a regression model that predicts the probability that a transfer student earns a bachelor's degree within six academic years from their first enrollment at community college. The models predict BA completion based on community college and student characteristics and the student's high school. Data are from the Oregon Department of Education and include students who graduated from high school between 2004/05 and 2010/11 and entered community college between 2005/06 and 2011/12.

### What are overall community college transfer student outcomes at WOU?

Among WOU transfer students who began their studies at community college between 2007/08 and 2010/11, **308 (44.8%)** received a BA within six years from WOU.

#### Who is included in this sample?

- Entered an Oregon community college in the fall between 2007/08 to 2010/11
- Earned at least 12 credits of any kind in their first year
