1. I contacted my friends who attended WOU, and began asking if this is an option they would benefit from. They all said yes, but of course I could not keep track of everything.



156/164 = **94.6% would benefit from the S/NC option** 


Out of <u>164 responses</u> ---- <u>9 students said NO</u> to having the S/NS



#### Faculty Responses

- 1) Student stress levels are high. Much of this stress has nothing to do with school. And since education is our primary goal at the university, we should seek reasonable means to increase this education, even if it means that we adhere less to our previous grading ideologies.
- 2) Without face-to-face classes, students are not getting the full college experience, so they should not be graded as though they are.
- 3) Some students are not served as well in online classes. I can speak from experience as a new online teacher that some of the things that are simple in a face-to-face class become incredibly hard online. I also suspect that many students who have questions don't ask them by email or chat or phone; these same shy students would probably wait after class and talk with the instructor even if they were too shy to ask in class. So, by making classes pass/fail, we relieve some of the burden on shy students. Also, outgoing students or students with high verbal skills may find that online interaction—especially in asynchronous classes that deal entirely in written texts—is not as beneficial as in-person classes
- **4)** During this deadly pandemic, students should be given a variety of ways to fulfill their educational requirements. So I think that the pass/fail option is one among many tools we can use to continue education under such trying circumstance.
