As we prepare to launch our new General Education program in a few months, we wanted to reflect on our experience and what this program means to us.

I believe that educational equity, fairness and opportunity in education, is an important part of creating a more just society. This is why the overhaul of the general education curriculum has been so important to me these last few years. No longer does our general education require the knowledge of a hidden curriculum to successfully navigate the various category rules. And our students can now go to one office to get help understanding exceptions and petitions. Moreover, with alignment to general education learning outcomes and the thorough general education assessment plan, we can work hard to ensure that students are getting a comprehensive general education. These changes will help all students, but will be specifically impactful for first-in-family college students navigating higher education for the first time. - 2. Developed and Refined Processes Related to the new General Education Program:
 - a. Developed the General Education Transfer Guidelines (Faculty Senate voted to approve on November 27th, 2018)
 - b. Reviewed the General Education Assessment Plan developed by the GE leadership team
 - c. Developed Process and deadlines for future FYS call for proposals
 - d. Developed Student GE exceptions petition process and reviewed many petitions (over 130 to date)
 - e. Developed Writing and Mathematics Criteria
 - f. Updated committee charge and ex-officio membership
 - g. Reviewed the General Education Proposal Handbook, including changes to the GE petition forms

 - a. Oregon Transfer Compass Alignment (Faculty Senate voted to approve on November 27th, 2018)
