Getting Help for Students

Getting started

For all new students, we recommend completion of First Year Seminars and Foundations courses as early as possible. Successful completion of these requirements are correlated with student retention to graduation.

First Year Seminars

Incoming freshmen should plan to take FYS 107 and FYS 207 in their first year. These courses do not have to be taken in order and may even be taken together in the same term. Placement Tests for Mathematics and Writing

Any student may meet their Foundations: Mathematics requirement when they score 61 or higher on the WOU ALEKS Math Assessment in a timed and proctored environment. Students may submit a request for a proctored exam after taking an ALEKS test with an initial practice score of 61 or higher. For more information, go to: http://www.wou.edu/math/aleks/aleks-gen-ed/

Many majors require math courses as major requirements which will also fulfill the General Education requirement; Students placing in MTH 95 or lower may need to complete non-credit bearing prerequisites first, depending on the course required in their major.

In Foundations: Writing, WR 121 proficiency can be earned with a score of 560-800 on the writing portion of the SAT and/or a score of 21-30 on the writing portion of the ACT. Students may also request a Writing placement exam to demonstrate proficiency for WR 121 or

First Year Seminar Spotlight

As our first group of First Year Seminars launches, one pair of faculty members have developed a learning community opportunity that brings together a writing-focused section of FYS 107 with a quantitative-focused section of FYS 207. Dr. Laurie Burton and Dr. Katherine Schmidt are collaborating to offer the linked learning community: Can our food choices help save the world? In this community, the students register for both courses together and engage in complementary learning experiences to reflect on what it means to eat compassionately and examine the consequences of plant-based diets through investigations and displays of information. Laurie and Katherine describe their planning for students:

We will have students journal and collect data in FYS 107, learn fun ways to work with and display data in FYS 207, and work in both courses to create digital projects to share their work and learning with others. Of course, we'll also make sure our students learn about our many campus resources that can help them succeed at WOU.
