

What, who, and how does this impact you

- Close the Aquatic Center: \$35,721
- Reduce HWC by 5 hours per week: \$8,170
- Reduce Intramurals: \$3,551

- 22.5 fewer operating hours
- elimination of Aquatic Center Programs revenue and swim lessons
- elimination of 24 student salaries
- reduced utilities and custodial services

FY25 - \$94,885 Areas of Reduction What, who, and how does this impact you

- Cut Fitness classes: \$5,735
- Reduce Climbing Wall 5.5 hours/week: \$5,465
- Reduce HWC 15 hours/week: \$24,510
- Reduce Club Sports by 10%: \$5,450
- Reduce Turf Field by 15%: \$3,447

- 47.75 fewer operating hours
- reduced program availability
- reduction of classes and student salaries
- reduced custodial services
- reduced administrative charge

REDUCTION 15% ALL 5% AND 10% REDUCTIONS ADDED

FY25 - \$142,327 Areas of Reduction What, who, and how does this impact you

- Remove all custodial services: \$24,735
- Reduce HWC 10 hours/week: \$16,340
- Reduce Intramural Sports by 20%: \$8,897

- 57.5 fewer operating hours
- reduction in sports offerings
- reduction of usage and student salaries
- cancellation of custodial services
- reduced professional staff oversight
- reduced administrative charge

AQUATIC CENTER

Equipment costs over the past 3 years:

- Fiberglassed the Surge Tank
- RenoSys Pool Liner replaced
- Full chlorination system replaced
- Chemtrol Electronic Chemical systems replaced
- UltraViolet light replacement and maintenance
- Air compressor and air lines replaced
- Swimming pool pump replaced
- Steam condensation unit replaced
- Neptune Benson filter systems part rebuilds We are making a difference.



FACILITY MAINTENANCE

FACILITY MAINTENANCE

The turf field is home to Rugby (Womens+ and Men), Lacrosse (Men), and Soccer (Women and Men) practice and is the only field where they can practice and play all of their home matches.

Also, it is used by NCAA Soccer (Women and Men), Football (Men), Baseball (Men), and Softball (Women) teams. Last year was the first year the NCAA Soccer teams played their matches on the turf field.

At 12 years old and over 80-90 hours of practice/game time a week it needs to be replaced, we must reduce compaction with semi-annually outside maintenance.

CLUB SPORTS

The funding Club Sports receives from IFC typically only covers approximately 60% of what it takes to operate the program.

The gap in operating funds has come from countless hours of fundraising and continually asking more for player dues and family support.

The average fundraising amount for all of Club Sports over the past two years has been \$44,226.
