The RAE is affiliated with national language academies in 22 other Spanish-speaking nations through the Association of Spanish Language Academies. The RAE and ASALE promote pan-Hispanic linguistic unity and integrity within and among their respective territories to ensure a common language standard while acknowledging polycentric koinés. To achieve this goal, RAE regularly publishes dictionaries, grammars, orthographies and classical literary works. This is an honor and clearly recognizes Dr. Giménez-Eguíbar's expertise in her field.
- Congratulations to Communications NTT Assistant Professor Dr. Tiara Good on the publication of her new book, *Rhetoric of the Opioid Epidemic: Deaths of Despair in America*. This work argues for framing the opioid epidemic as a medical issue rather than a moral failing, drawing upon historical frameworks of criminality and immorality that characterized much discussion of the crack epidemic and AIDS crisis. AWARD AND PUBLICATION BY DR. DANA SCHOWALTER

Congratulations to Dr Dana Schowalter, Associate Professor of Communication Studies, for receiving the Communication Association Convention's award for Top Panel in the Media Studies division of the Central States Communication Association, one of four regional conferences in the field of Communication Studies. Dr. Schowalter's paper is an extension of her recent book publication, *The Misogynistic Backlash Against Women-Strong Films*, co-authored with Shannon Stevens and Daniel L. Horvath.

According to Humanities Division Chair Dr. Paula Baldwin, "Dr. Schowalter and her co-authors explore the political struggle for visibility engendered by the growing number of women-centered popular films, along with critical analysis of the intensifying misogynistic backlash that has accompanied advances in the depiction of women on screen."

The book includes case studies on Mad Max: Fury Road, Wonder Woman, Atomic Blonde, Star Wars, and Ghostbusters, analyzing critical responses, "men'srights" boycotting campaigns, online harassment, and the political economy that preceded and accompanied the creation and presentation of these films. This is an accessible and timely analysis of the rise of feminist-friendly and women-led films and the inevitable counter-response of misogyny. Kudos to Dr. Schowalter and her colleagues on the publication of this important study.
