Cheyanne Heidt is the Curriculum Specialist for The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde and a Grand Ronde Tribal Member. She grew up in Willamina, Oregon - just ten minutes from the Grand Ronde Reservation where she still lives with her husband, Tyler, and their 3-year-old daughter, Palmer.

Heidt completed her undergraduate and teaching license in 2018 from Oregon State University where she discovered her passion for Culturally Responsive Teaching and Native American Education. This carried into her graduate degree in Education from Western Oregon University where she focused on Culturally

Responsive Teaching in the K-5 classroom. She fills her days developing curriculum, working with educators, and chasing her toddler around as they explore the Pacific Northwest.

This keynote speech will discuss the importance of planning for the next seven generations and how this concept has driven me to make a positive difference in my Native American community. I will discuss the history of the Tribe, our current



struggles, and how we can work together to create a better future. I will also share my personal journey of finding my role in making a difference, and how we can all take steps towards creating a better future for generations to come.

Dominique Vargas (she/her) is the inaugural Executive Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at Western Oregon University. Dominique started at WOU on June 1, 2022. She was most recently at University of Wisconsin-Stout Menomonie, Wisconsin where she was the inaugural Executive Director and Associate Dean of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion.

Vargas has worked in higher education for more than 13 years. She was a first generation, low income, Puerto Rican student when she first started her college career back at a small regional university in 2002. She has made it her priority to increase access to higher education opportunities for historically excluded and exploited communities. Vargas is a lifelong learner who attempts

to utilize an equity lens in every aspect of her work. She is a runner and loves hiking.

Self-reflection and growth are journeys without specific destinations. I believe the more grounded we are in our self-identity the more we can positively impact our community. It is hard to maintain mental health and it is hard to fight for social justice, when we are



not grounded in who we are. I will reflect on my experiences that led me to WOU and I will invite you to reflect on who you are and how that impacts you as a member of yours and our communities.

She holds a Bachelor's degree in Nursing, a Master's degree in Creative Arts Therapy, and a Ph.D. in Counselor Education.

As a professor, Dr. Ni is passionate about helping students develop the skills and knowledge they need to make a difference in the world. She is a strong advocate for social justice and equity and is committed to using her teaching and research to promote positive change. Dr. Ni serves on the Oregon License and Professional Counselor and Therapists Board. Before that, she served two full terms on the Oregon State

Rehabilitation Council to monitor the effectiveness of its policies, programs, and services in meeting the needs of Oregonians with disabilities.

Dr. Ni is an accomplished scholar. Her research has been published in leading counseling, rehabilitation, and mental health journals. In her spare time, she enjoys traveling, hiking, and cross-country skiing with her family, including a white shepherd pup named Bolt.
