Meet the *Upward Bound Program* (TRIO)

(located in the APSC, room #501)

What we do:

Upward Bound (TRIO) is a pre-college program for high school students from low-income families and/or students whose parents did not graduate from college. Services include tutoring, advising, academic and cultural enrichment activities, college visits, and a six-week residential summer school program held on the WOU campus. Upward Bound serves students at three area high schools: Central (Monmouth/Independence), Dallas, and McKay (Salem). The program is funded by a US Department of **Education TRIO Grant.**

Did you know?

Upward Bound was launched nationally in 1965 during President Lyndon B. Johnson's "War on Poverty", through The Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. It was the first of the federal "TRIO" programs - educational outreach programs created to support disadvantaged students. The Upward Bound Program at WOU was established in 1999.

We provide reasonable accommodations to ensure that students with disabilities have access to Western Oregon University (WOU) and its programs; through intentional interventions, programs, and services in order that WOU will meet federal requirements, encourage personal growth, and increase effective communication for our students.

Did you know?

ODS staff, self-proclaimed "Team Awesome", employs 8 full time staff and 4 student staff who all have various skill levels in the ability to communicate in American Sign Language. Serving just over 400 students, roughly 7% of the WOU student population, with a variety of disabilities, the majority having invisible disabilities. Most common accommodations include note takers, alternative materials format, alternative test arrangement and American Sign Language Interpreting. ODS has a strong commitment to serving underrepresented populations with enthusiasm and passion.

Did you know?

Honors students are integral to numerous offices and groups on campus, ranging from RA's, Peer Mentors, PLUS team members, tutors, and athletic teams. We easily smack down the stereotype of Honors students as distant or elite. Some fun facts:

- 1. The Honors Program is at record enrollment and represents 3.25% of WOU's enrollment -- the same percentage as UO and OSU Honors Programs.
- 2. Honors graduates now work full-time in the WOU Bookstore, the Registrar's Office, the Honors Office, and the President's Office. Two Honors graduates also work full time as NTT instructors in the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Sciences and Education.
- 3. Over 25% of honors students study abroad.
- 4. Last year Honors students generated one-third of the money raised for charity during the campus Walk for Life.

Did you know?

The Writing Center started in 1998 and was housed in a small space that was the size of a closet in HSS. After it moved to APSC, it shared a space on the fourth floor with AALC before being moved to its current location on the third floor. We really try to make our space unique and have painted our walls to match our personable approach to writing and tutoring. We also decorate the Writing Center based on the season to make our space more inviting. Our department is very small and is made up of three staff members and 15 tutors, who are truly the heart of our operations. Katherine Schmidt, the director, has worked at WOU for 12 years, and the other two staff members, Xinjie Luo and Rosario Peralta, are both WOU grads.



Food Pantry

Did you know?

The WOU Food Pantry started in 2011 as one of Dr. Natalie DeWitt's class projects. About that same time, WOU classified staff conducted a survey and discovered significant food insecurity among staff. The two independent efforts joined forces and brought ASWOU on board. The Pantry is now run by ASWOU, staffed by volunteers and funded entirely by donations.

There have been several important changes recently. The "Friends of the Food Pantry" updated their bylaws and sought new members. Now, a robust committee of 10 food activists from campus and the surrounding community offers guidance and acts as stewards of the WOU Food Pantry Foundation Fund. Their first official act was working with ASWOU to create and fund the Director of the Food Pantry.

The first Director of the Food Pantry, Christie Colasurdo, has made significant strides forward since the fall. Hours are consistent and reliable and the number of volunteers at the Pantry is increasing. If you haven't seen the WOU Food Pantry in the last couple of months, you should check out what a great job they are doing.
