usage for Auxiliary Services and Valsetz Dinning are separately metered, budgeted and paid separately by them, I do not have access to those figures.

Recycling is for the 2006 fiscal year and there are many venders involved. The budget for recycling is approximately \$16,000 per year which covers disposal costs and contract fees etc. Returns from all of Recycling can vary from \$3,000 to \$5,000.00 per year.

For the University, recycling is not a money maker, but all that we DO recycle helps in reducing reusable waste going into our landfills. Every little bit helps in reducing garbage costs and conserving our

natural resources.

New programs are always being developed to reduce the Universities consumption and

> waste. Over the past few years the Physical Plant has been installing new energy efficient lighting throughout campus. To name one project, New PE Gym was a major undertaking by replacing the lighting

has provided substantial savings. Another project completed which will save energy costs, has been the replacement of the old cooling tower at the Administration building's chiller. Cooling towers are a major component for the cooling of buildings. Other areas for conserving energy are computers. Think how many computers are in use on campus. Even with a sleep mode, electricity is being used to power each sleeping unit. Please turn them off along with your office lights when you are to be away for long periods of time.

In November of 2006 the Physical Plant purchased a trash compactor to save costs in hauling fees. With the compactor we can get more waste per load and haul when full, where as open trash dumpsters could only be filled to the top rim and was on a weekly pick up schedule.

All wood waste products are now being separated and placed in a 30 yard dumpster. This wood waste is hauled to a local recycling center, which will then chop the waste up into planting/bedding mulch instead of it going to the landfill. The cost is also cheaper than dumping it in the landfill.

There is still a lot of good recyclables going in the trash. I.e. drink containers and paper. It only takes a little effort to place it in a recycle container. If departments have empty toner cartridges, please save them for recycling. I have just started an agreement with the local Lions club who will collect all of our empty toner cartridges as a fund raiser for their organization.

- *Americans use enough corrugated cardboard in a year to make a bale the size of a football field. About 40% of it is recycled.
- * If Americans recycled half our newsprint every year, we'd need 3,200 fewer garbage trucks to collect municipal trash.
- * Americans throw away enough used motor oil every year to fill 120 supertankers. It could all be recycled.
- * To make plastics, the U.S. uses about a billion barrels of petroleum by-products each year. This is enough to fill over 56,000 Olympic-sized swimming pools.
- * Every year, Americans dispose of 1.6 billion pens, 2 billion razors and blades, and 18 billion diapers.
