Sustainability is becoming an important part of the WOU culture. Many departments are making special efforts to leave a smaller footprint on the earth.

- Compostable dinnerware is used in both Valsetz and in the Dining Service areas in the WUC (Wolf Grill & Deli, Wolf Express & Café Allegro). Deposit your items in the barrels with an apple symbol.
